The ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius holds its fourth Bucerius Summer School on Global Governance from 9 August to 21 August 2004 – this year in cooperation with the Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung.

Since 1971, the ZEIT Foundation, Germany's fifth-largest private foundation, has funded projects in various fields of science and research, education and training, as well as arts and culture. The Foundation was established by Gerd Bucerius, the late founder and publisher of Germany's leading quality weekly, DIE ZEIT. Among others, Roman Herzog, former German President, Helmut Schmidt, former German Chancellor, and Theo Sommer, Editor-at-Large of DIE ZEIT, serve on its Board of Trustees. The Board's chairman is Manfred Lahnstein, former German Minister of Finance.

The Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung – together with the Foundation Westphalia – is one of two non-profit foundations established by the IT entrepreneur Heinz Nixdorf, who died in 1986. The Foundation promotes professional education, scientific research and teaching, liberal and democratic governmental systems and public health. The Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum (HNF) in Paderborn/ Westphalia uniquely combines the classic historical dimension of a museum with the current and future-oriented topics of a forum. The HNF is the largest computer museum of the world.

The Bucerius Summer School harks back to Henry Kissinger's renowned International Summer Seminar at Harvard University. In the 1960s, Kissinger brought together young leaders from all over the world for a summer course of debates and lectures. Many of the seminar's alumni and alumnae rose to important national or international positions.

The overall aim of the Bucerius Summer School is to foster leadership qualities in young professionals by opening a cross-border dialogue on current political, economic, social and jurid-

ical questions. Participants are inspired by – and learn from – high-profile speakers who are eminent public figures in politics, business, academia and the NGO sphere.

The list of keynote speakers in the 2004 Bucerius Summer School will include Professor Gesine Schwan, President of Europe University Viadrina, Frankfurt/Oder, and recently candidate of the German Social Democratic Party for the Federal Presidency; Professor John Ruggie from the Kennedy School of Government; Professor Lester Thurow from MIT in Boston: Richard Perle, former advisor to U.S. Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld and now with the American Enterprise Institute in Washington DC; State Secretary Dr. Klaus Scharioth from the German Foreign Office; Abderrahim Foukara from Al-Jazeera: Abdel Bari Atwan, Chief-Editor of Al-Quds Al Arabi; Professor Anne-Marie Slaughter, Dean of the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University; Dr. h.c. Horst Teltschik, erstwhile National Security Advisor to former Chancellor Kohl and presently President of Boeing Germany, and many other distinguished speakers from all over the world.

This year's Bucerius Summer School is the fourth in a series that the ZEIT-Stiftung offers on an annual basis. Its focus on "Global Governance" reflects the necessity to deal with the structure, the extent and the side-effects of globalization. This year's program covers a wide range of topics: international terrorism and security, the "clash of civilizations" and the changing roles of states and markets, the North-South divide, the WTO regime after Cancún and the search for a new world order in the age of American supremacy.

From some 300 applicants this year we invited 60 promising junior executives, politicians and academics from 26 different countries – young women and men between 28 and 35 years of age who have already acquired some professional experience, but have not yet reached the peak of their careers.

To follow up on the annual Summer School we run an active alumni network. With the support of the ZEIT-Stiftung alumni

arrange follow-up seminars (so-called "Governance Talks") to discuss current developments. Recently such gatherings took place in Warsaw to celebrate (and discuss) Poland's accession to the European Union and at BASF Headquarters in Ludwigshafen with the focus on "Corporate Governance". The next alumni reunion will take place in Lisbon in mid-September.

Theo Sommer, Editor-at-Large of DIE ZEIT, chairs the sessions of the Bucerius Summer School. Lectures and workshops are held at the Steigenberger Hotel in downtown Hamburg, and – for a one-day session – at the German Foreign Office in Berlin. This year the Summer School also includes a one-day visit to Munster and the Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum in Paderborn. Theo Sommer, Dean of the Bucerius Summer School, and Oliver Gnad, Director of the Bucerius Summer School, are responsible for the two-week program. Anne Spinder will see to it that everything runs smoothly and will lend a friendly ear to everyone with a problem, a suggestion or a complaint.

The ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius and the Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung extend a cordial welcome to all speakers and participants. We wish them many fruitful discussions, a host of new insights and, above all, a pleasant stay in the Free and Hanseatic City of Hamburg.

Heman Agrawal has been Assistant Lecturer and Associate Researcher at the Chair for Economics and Philosophy of the Business Faculty at the University Witten/Herdecke, Germany, since 2003. His academic work focuses on Institutional Economics, Theories of Political Economy, Development Economics, Theories of International Relations, History of Economic Thought, Issues of North-South Relations, Globalisation and Global Governance Research. In 2002 his book "Fairness in a Fragile World" has been awarded as "best publication of the World Summit (WSSD)".

Imran Habib Ahmad, an alumnus of the Bucerius Summer School class of 2002, is an experienced environment and development professional and an international resource person in the area of climate change and multilateral environmental agreements, the intergovernmental process on climate change, biodiversity, ozone and sustainable development. He is a member of the UNFCCC Expert Group on Technology Transfer. Currently he is undertaking independent study, teaching and research in the area of climate change and multilateral environmental agreements and is also an editor/writer for the Earth Negotiations Bulletin (ENB) published by the International Institute for Sustainable Development.

Abdel Bari Atwan is Chief Editor of the most influential arabic newspaper outside the arabic world, Al-Quds Al-Arabi, edited in London. From 1984 to 1988 he served as Managing Editor of Al-Sharq Al Awsat and Al Majala Magazine, London. Moreover he lectures on Middle East Politics at British and Arab universities and has published several studies about Middle East Politics and the role of the Media.

Dr. Kurt Beiersdörfer has been Managing Director of the Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum in Paderborn since 1997. Before he joined the MuseumsForum in 1996, he had been Consultant and Associate Program Director at the Robert Bosch Foundation in Stuttgart.

Dr. Thilo Bode is director of foodwatch, an NGO dealing with transparency in the food sector. Before founding foodwatch in 2001 he was Executive Director of Greenpeace International (1995 to 2001) and of Greenpeace Germany (1989 to 1995). In the nineteen-seventies and eighties he gained first-hand experience in planning, managing and monitoring infrastructure projects in developing countries with Lahmeyer International, Frankfurt/Main, and at the German Bank for Reconstruction and Development (KfW).

Dr. Kurt Bock is Member of the Board of Executive Directors and Chief Financial Officer of BASF AG, Ludwigshafen, Germany. Since he has been joining the finance division of the BASF AG in 1985, he has held several positions: President Logistics & Information Services, BASF AG, 2000; Chief Financial Officer, BASF Corporation, Mount Olive, New Jersey, USA, 1998; Managing Director, Robert Bosch Ltd., Campinas, Brazil, 1996; Senior Vice President, Finance and Accounting, Robert Bosch GmbH, Stuttgart, Germany, 1994; Head of Technology, Planning and Controlling, Engineering Plastics division, BASF AG, 1991.

Elmar Brok is chairman of the European Parliament's Committee on Foreign Affairs, Human Rights, Common Security and Defense Policy. Since 1980, he is a member of the European Peoples Party (EPP) fraction in the European Parliament. Therein he holds several positions: Member of the board of the EPP, Deputy Member of the Committee on Constitutional Affairs and Member in the EU Convention on the Future of the Union. He is also President of the "Europa-Union" Germany, a pan-european, non-partisan association. Moreover, he is Vice Chairman of the European Movement Germany and Chairman of the Study Group "Enlargement" of the Institute for European Policy in Bonn.

Dr. Ivo H. Daalder is a Senior Fellow in Foreign Policy Studies at the Brookings Institution, where he also holds the Sydney Stein Jr. Chair in International Security. His current research focuses on the implications of globalization and American power for U.S. foreign policy, homeland security organization, and the past, present, and future of the national security council. Prior to joining Brookings, he was associate professor at the University of Maryland's School of Public Affairs. In 1995/96, he served as director for European Affairs on President Clinton's National Security Council staff. From 1998 to 2001, Dr. Daalder served as a member of the Study Group of the U.S. Commission on National Security/21st Century (the Hart-Rudman Commission). He is a member of the Academy of Political Science, the Council on Foreign Relations, and the IISS.

Dr. Heribert Dieter is a Researcher at Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik (SWP) in Berlin, where he is a specialist for International Economic Relations, Globalization and Regionalism as well as for Financial Markets. He has been an Associate Fellow of the Centre for the Study of Globalization and Regionalization of the World Economy, University of Warwick since 2000. He was Senior Fellow at the Institute for Development and Peace, University of Duisburg, Germany, from 1998 to 2001 and Programme Officer at the German Foundation for International Development from 1993 to 1997.

Jörg Dräger, PhD, has been Minster for Public Health and Science of the Free and Hanseatic City of Hamburg since 2001. He served as General Manager of the Northern Institute of Technology, Hamburg, from 1999 to 2001 and as management consultant at Roland Berger Strategy Consultants, Frankfurt/Main from 1996 to 1998. From 1991 to 1996 he was scholar and research assistant at Cornell University, New York.

Prof. Dr. Peter Eigen is founder and chairman of Transparency International, a non-governmental organization promoting transparency and accountability in regional and international development. He has worked in economic development for 25 years, mainly as a World Bank manager of programs in Africa and Latin America. Under Ford Foundation sponsorship, he provided legal and technical assistance to the governments of Botswana and Namibia and taught law at the universities of Frankfurt/Main and Georgetown. From 1999 to 2001 he was Adjunct Lecturer at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. In 2001, he joined the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace as Visiting Scholar while teaching at Johns Hopkins University/ The Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies.

Abderrahim Foukara works since 2002 as the UN correspondent of Al-Jazeera, the most influential TV-channel in the Arabic world. He started his career at the BBC in 1990 joining BBC World Service. There he worked as producer, reporter and anchor in various departments, including the Arabic, African and French departments. In 1998, he became BBC World Service Training's Senior Instructor, designing and teaching journalism courses. From 1999 to 2001, he worked for The World, a Boston-based co-production of the BBC World Service, the American Public Radio International and WGBH Boston, as a producer, reporter and occasional host.

Prof. Sir Lawrence Freedman has been Professor of War Studies at King's College, London since 1982. He has recently been appointed to the position of Vice Principal (Research) at King's, having previously been Head of the School of Social Science and Public Policy. Before joining King's College he held research appointments at Nuffield College Oxford, IISS and the Royal Institute of International Affairs. Elected a Fellow of the British Academy in 1995, he has been awarded the CBE in 1996 and the KCMG in 2003. He was appointed Official Historian of the Falklands Campaign in 1997. Professor Freedman has written extensively on nuclear strategy and the cold war and is a frequent commentator on contemporary security issues.

Prof. Dr. Michael Göring has been Managing Director of the ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius and member of its Board of Directors since 1997. Before entering the ZEIT-Stiftung Professor Göring was head of foreign and overseas affairs at the German National Merit Foundation (Studienstiftung des deutschen Volkes) and head of the funding department at the Alfried Krupp von Bohlen und Halbach-Stiftung. He is a member of various advisory boards, primarily foundations and organisations of higher education.

Prof. Dr. Klaus Gretschmann has been Director-General of the Economic Policy Directorate at the Council of the European Union in Brussels since 2001. Prior to that engagement he has held several positions: Professor of Public Finance and General Economics, Aachen University of Technology, Germany; Professor of International Economics and Head, Community Policies and Economics Unit, European Institute of Public Administration, Maastricht, The Netherlands; Consultant for EU, OECD, IMF; Adviser on matters of European economics and EMU to the Austrian National Bank and the Finnish Central Bank; Project Director of several EU Commission Projects. Professor Gretschmann also held the positions of Director-General, Chief Economist and G8 Sherpa at the German Federal Chancellery in Berlin.

Prof. Dr. Detlef Junker is Curt-Engelhorn Professor at the University of Heidelberg for American History. A Yale post-doc, he has also taught at the Universities of Nebraska, Lincoln and Stuttgart. From 1994 to 1999 he was Director of the German Historical Institute in Washington DC. In 2003 he became Founding Director of the interdisciplinary Heidelberg Center for American Studies. His research has focused on German politics in the interwar period, on American foreign policy in the twentieth century, on German-American relations and on the history of the Cold War.

Christoph Keese currently is Chief Editor of Welt am Sonntag, edited in Berlin. From 1997 onwards he was deeply involved in the creation process of the German edition of Great Britain's most famous business paper – The Financial Times. Before joining Financial Times Deutschland Mr. Keese worked as editor and chief of the business department at the daily paper Berliner Zeitung. He was Chief Editor of the Financial Times Deutschland from 2001 until May 2004.

Georg Kell is Executive Head of the UN Global Compact Office, overseeing a network that includes several hundred companies, international labour, non-governmental organizations and other civil society groups. He was one of the chief architects of the Global Compact initiative, launched by Secretary-General Kofi Annan in 1999 to promote good corporate citizenship and responsible globalization. Mr. Kell joined the executive office of the Secretary-General in 1997 as a senior officer responsible for fostering cooperation with the private sector. Prior to joining the United Nations, he worked as a financial analyst in developing countries, especially in Asia and Africa.

Dr. Bernd Klein is partner of the law firm Schmidt, von der Osten & Huber in Essen. Apart from other tasks he is responsible for the management of the Heinz Nixdorf Foundation. He studied law at the Universities of Bonn, Freiburg and Berkeley (LL.M.).

Dr. Klaus Kleinfeld has been member of the Corporate Executive Committee of Siemens AG since 2004. He served as President and Chief Executive Officer of Siemens Corporation, the U.S. branch of Siemens AG, and was also a member of the Managing Board of Siemens AG from 2002 to 2003. Prior to his U.S. assignment, he was executive vice president and a member of the executive board of the medical engineering group of Siemens AG in Germany. From 2005 onwards Dr. Kleinfeld will be heading Siemens as its CEO – the third largest German company with more than 400,000 employees in 190 countries.

Caio Koch-Weser is State Secretary at the Federal Ministry of Finance, Berlin. Prior to joining the Ministry in 1999, Mr. Koch-Weser served as Managing Director and as a member of the Executive Committee at the World Bank in Washington DC. From 1996 to 1999, he was head of the World Bank's working group for institutional renewal. As Managing Director, he assumed responsibility for a wide range of the World Bank's operations and operational policies: Decentralization, the Bank's relations with the Global Environment Facility (GEF), the supervision of the Vice-Presidencies for Europe and Central Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, the Middle East and North Africa, and of the networks for Human Development, Environmentally and Socially Sustainable Development, and Operational Core Services.

Wolfgang Kroh has been member of the Board of Managing Directors of KfW Banking Group since 2000. After studying Business Administration in Frankfurt, he has been starting his carrier in KfW Banking Group. From 1996 to 2000 he was Senior Vice President of the Secretariat of International Credit Affairs, responsible for corporate and operations policy, principles and promotional concepts for Financial Cooperation with developing countries. Before he became KfW's First Vice President in 1988 he worked as a Project Manager in the Regional Department Africa for Financial Corporation projects in Nigeria, Ghana, Swaziland, Lesotho (1971 to 1976).

General Harald Kujat is Chairman of the NATO Military Committee and Inspector General of the German Armed Forces. Among other posts he was Director of the Policy and Advisory Staff to the German Minister of Defence, Berlin, from 1998 to 2000; Assistant Director, International Military Staff (Plans & Policy) and Deputy Director IMS, NATO Headquarters, Brussels from 1996 to 1998; Director, IFOR Co-ordination Centre (ICC) at SHAPE, Belgium, in 1996; Deputy Chief of Staff (Military Policy and Strategy), Armed Forces Staff, Federal Ministry of Defence, Bonn, in 1995 and Chief of Staff and Deputy German Military Representative to the NATO Military Committee and Western European Union, Brussels, from 1992 to 1995.

Prof. Dr. Charles A. Kupchan is Professor of International Relations at the School of Foreign Service and Government Department at Georgetown University. He also holds the position of a Senior Fellow and Director of Europe Studies at the Council on Foreign Relations. During the first Clinton administration he was Director for European Affairs on the National Security Council. Before joining the NSC, he was a member of the U.S. State Department's Policy Planning Staff. Prior to government service, he was Assistant Professor of Politics at Princeton University.

Prof. Manfred Lahnstein is Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius. Prior to being German Federal Minister of Finance (1982), he was chief of the Federal Chancellery in Bonn from 1980 to 1982 and State Secretary of the Federal Ministry of Finance from 1977 to 1980. He has been active in the private sector as a member of the Board of Directors for Bertelsmann AG from 1983 to 1994, where he was responsible for the development of the New Media sector. From 1994 to 1998 he was a member of Bertelsmann's supervisory board. In 1994 he founded Lahnstein & Partner, International Consultants, Hamburg.

Prof. Dr. Catherine McArdle Kelleher is a specialist in international relations, comparative defense studies and arms control. She joined the Naval War College faculty as professor of strategic studies in 2001. She served as Director of Aspen Institute, Berlin, from 1998 to 2001; Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense, from 1996 to 1998; the Secretary of Defense's personal representative in Europe and Defense Adviser to the U.S. Ambassador to NATO, from 1994 to 1996; Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institute, from 1991 to 1994 and Professor of International Relations at the University of Maryland from 1982 to 1991.

Dr. Thomas Mirow was the top candidate of the Social Democratic Party for the election to the Hamburg Parliament in 2004. Since 2002, he has been Senior Advisor and Entrepreneur. Dr. Mirow served as spokesman of the Hamburg Senate from 1983 to 1987 and then worked as Political and Business Consultant before becoming Senator for Finance of the Free and Hanseatic City of Hamburg in 1991. From 1975 to 1983 he was Assistant and Chef de Cabinet to former Chancellor Willy Brandt.

Prof. Dr. Andrew Moravcsik is Professor of Government and Director of the European Union Program at Harvard University, where he has taught international relations since 1992. During the academic year 2003/04 he is also Visiting Senior Research Fellow at the Department of Politics at Princeton University. Before coming to Harvard, he served as trade negotiator at the U.S. Department of Commerce, as editor-in-chief of a foreign policy journal in Washington DC, as speechwriter and editor of the National Economic Bulletin for the Deputy Prime Minister of South Korea in Seoul, and in other public- and private-sector positions. He has held research and teaching positions at the University of Chicago, Columbia University, New York University, as well as universities and research institutes in France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, and Belgium.

Prof. Dr. Harald Müller has been Executive Director of the Peace Research Institute Frankfurt (PRIF) since 1996 and Professor for International Relations at the Goethe University, Frankfurt/Main since 1999. The same year, he has been appointed Co-Chairman of the Advisory Council on Peace and Conflict at the German Foreign Office and since 2000 he is a member of the Advisory Council of the Federal Academy for Security Policy. Moreover, he is a member of the Council of the Federal Foundation for Peace since 2001. Since the beginning of this year he serves as Chairman of the UN's Advisory Board on Disarmament.

Prof. Dr. Michael Nacht is Dean and Professor of Public Policy at the Goldman School of Public Policy at the University of California, Berkeley. Prior to this position, he served as Assistant Director for Strategic and Eurasian Affairs of the U.S Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. He directed the Agency's work on nuclear arms reduction and missile defense negotiations with Russia and designed the first high-level nuclear arms dialogue with China. From 1984 to 1998, he was member of the faculty of the University of Maryland where he was Dean and Professor at the School of Public Affairs from 1986 to 1994. From 1973 to 1984, he was Associate Professor of Public Policy and Associate Director of the Center for Science and International Affairs at the Kennedy School of Government.

Richard Perle has been Resident Fellow at the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research, Washington DC, since 1987 where he had directed its commission on Future Defenses. He is a leading authority on national security, military requirements, arms proliferation and defense, and regional conflicts. Previously he served as Chairman of the Defense Policy Board (2001 to 2003), Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Policy (1981 to 1987) and he served on the US Senate Staff (1960 to 1980). Mr. Perle writes frequently for the New York Times, Washington Post, Wall Street Journal, The Daily Telegraph, Jerusalem Post and other publications.

Prof. Dr. Shalini Randeria has been Professor at the Institute of Social and Cultural Anthropology, University of Zurich since 2003. From 2002 to 2003 she was Professor and Chair of the Department of Sociology and Social Anthropology at the Central European University Budapest and from 2001 to 2003 she worked for the project group "Civil Society: Historical and Social Perspectives" at the Social Science Research Centre Berlin (WZB). She held a Visiting Professorship at the University of Munich from 2001 to 2002 and taught social anthropology and sociology at the Free University Berlin from 1986 to 1993. Moreover she has carried out fieldwork in India and has been cooperating actively with grassroots movements in India and development organizations in Germany.

Prof. Dr. Dieter Rucht is Head of the Working Group Political Communication and Mobilization at the Social Science Research Center, Berlin (WZB). He has also been Honorary Professor at the newly founded School of Social Policy, Sociology and Social Research, University of Kent since 2000. He was Professor of Sociology at the University of Kent at Canterbury from 1998 to 2000 and held a Chair of Sociology (temporarily) at the John F. Kennedy-Institute for North America Studies and at the Institute of Sociology, Free University Berlin from 1996 to 1997.

Prof. Dr. John G. Ruggie is Kirkpatrick Professor of International Affairs and Weil Director, Center for Business and Government, at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. From 1997 to 2001, Ruggie was United Nations Assistant Secretary-General and chief adviser for strategic planning to Secretary-General Kofi Annan. Prior to joining the UN, Ruggie was Dean of Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs, where he taught for many years. He has also been on the faculty of the University of California's Berkeley and San Diego campuses, and directed the UC systemwide Institute on Global Conflict and Cooperation.

Nobert Ryska has been Managing Director of the Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum, Paderborn, since 1992. From 1992 to 1996 he headed the Executive Committee to establish the Museums Forum which was opened to the public in 1996. Before that, Mr. Ryska worked for the Nixdorf Computer AG as software engineer being a specialist for cash machines. He holds an university diploma in Mathematics and Software Engineering from the Bonn University, Germany.

Prof. Dr. Eberhard Sandschneider is Otto-Wolff-Director of the Research Institute of the German Council on Foreign Relations. He is also Dean of the Faculty of Political and Social Sciences at Berlin Free University; Executive Vice Chairman of the Asia Pacific Forum Berlin; Member of the Board of the German Society for Political Science and of the German Association for Asian Studies. From 1988 to 2002 he was Professor for Chinese Politics and International Relations and Director of the Center for Chinese and East Asian Studies at Free University Berlin.

Dr. Klaus Scharioth is State Secretary of the Federal Foreign Office of Germany. Prior to that, he served as Political Director and head of the Political Directorate-General from 1999 to 2002 and as Head of the International Security and North America Directorate from 1998 to 1999. His stations at the Foreign Office also include the Embassy in Quito, the Permanent Mission of the Federal Republic of Germany to the United Nations in New York and a position as Chef de cabinet of the NATO Secretary-General in Brussels. Dr. Scharioth has studied law and international relations in Germany, Switzerland and the United States and holds a PhD from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.

Dr. Gerhard Schmidt is Chairman of the Board of Directors of both Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung and Foundation Westphalia. He studied law at the Universities of Halle, Lausanne and Leipzig and is senior partner of the law firm Schmidt, von der Osten & Huber in Essen. For many years, he was advisor to entrepreneurs and industrial corporations and chairman of various supervisory boards. From 1976 until 1998, he was member of the foundation board of the World Economic Forum in Geneva/Dayos.

Dr. Rolf Schneider is head of Economic Research at the Dresdner Bank as well as head of Macro Research at the Allianz Group. He studied economics at the University of Freiburg and was a member of the academic staff at the Institute for Statistics and Econometrics. The focus of his academic work was on macroeconomic monetary models. From 1982 to 1987 he worked for the Council of Economic Experts responsible for economic forecasts. Since 1987 he has held various managerial posts in the Research Department of Dresdner Bank.

Prof. Dr. Gesine Schwan has been President of the Europe-University Viadrina Frankfurt/Oder, Germany, since 1999. Before serving as Viadrina's President she has held several academic positions: Dean of the Department of Political Science, Free University Berlin (1993 to 1995), Professor for Political Science at the Department of Political Science, Free University Berlin (1977 to 1999), Assistant Professor at the Department of Political Science, Free University Berlin (1971 to 1977). In spring 2004, Professor Schwan has been the candidate of the Social Democratic Party for the German Federal Presidency. She is also engaged in the founding of the "Humboldt-Viadrina School of Governance" which will open its gates in autumn 2005.

Prof. Dr. Anne-Marie Slaughter is Dean of the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University. Previously, she was J. Sinclair Armstrong Professor of International, Foreign and Comparative Law at Harvard Law School. Since 1997, she has served as Director of Graduate and International Legal Studies. Her teaching and research are focusing on global governance, the politics of international tribunals, and interdisciplinary analyses of international legal issues. Prior to changing over to Harvard, she was Professor of Law and International Relations at the University of Chicago Law School. A highly regarded expert on international law, Slaughter serves as president of the American Society of International Law.

Prof. Dr. William R. Smyser is currently serving as a consultant for international humanitarian issues and as a Professor at Georgetown University. He has a long-standing career in the United Nations, the U.S. Government, and foundation management tracing back to the nineteen-sixties. He was Initial Executive Director of the Conrad N. Hilton Humanitarian Prize, 1994 to 1996; Assistant Secretary-General of the United Nations and Deputy United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, 1981 to 1986; U.S. Deputy Assistant Secretary of State and Assistant Secretary of State for Refugee Programs, 1980 to 1981; Political Counsellor of the U.S. Embassy, Bonn, 1975 to 1979; Senior member of Henry Kissinger's National Security Council staff, 1970 to 1971 and 1973 to 1975 and General Lucius Clay's Special Assistant in Berlin, 1961 to 1962.

Dr. Theo Sommer is currently Editor-at-Large of the German weekly DIE ZEIT. From 1973 to 1992 he served as Editor-in-Chief and held the position of publisher from 1992 to 2000. Dr. Sommer headed the Policy Planning Staff of the German Defense Ministry from 1969 to 1970, was responsible for the White Book in 1970 and since then has played a prominent part in his posts as Vice-Chairman of the Commission on "Common Security and Future of the German Army". He was member of the International Commission on the Balkans (1995 to 1996) and of the Independent International Commission on Kosovo (1999 to 2000).

Prof. Dr. Stephen F. Szabo is Professor of European Studies at The Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, The Johns Hopkins University. He will hold the Steven Muller Chair in German Studies at the Bologna Center of Johns Hopkins University in 2004/2005. He teaches in the areas of European security, European politics and leadership, with a specialization on contemporary Germany. He served as Interim Dean of the Nitze School from 2001 to 2002. He also is Chair of the Advisory Council of the American Institute for Contemporary German Studies at Johns Hopkins. He was a Bosch Public Policy Fellow at the American Academy in Berlin in 2002 where he conducted research for a book on the German-American Relationship After 9/11. From 1982 to 1990 he was Professor of National Security Affairs at the National War College.

Naoki Tanaka is President of the 21st Century Public Policy Institute in Tokyo, an influential economic think tank. In 1994 he was member of the Administrative Reform Committee and in 1996 he chaired the Sub-committee for Appropriate Demarcation of the Public and Private Sector Activities. He also served as Head of the Japanese Prime Minister's advisory committee on postal reform

Nicholas Teller has been Member of the Board of Managing Directors of Commerzbank, Frankfurt/Main, since 2003. He is responsible for Banking Departments (Corporate Banking, Financial Institutions, Multinational Corporates). From 2002 to 2003 he was a Regional Board Member and from 1999 to 2001 General Manager of Commerzbank's Hamburg Branch. From 1994 to 1999 Teller was a General Manager of the Prague Branch and from 1982 to 1994 he worked at the London Branch of the Corporate Banking Department of Commerzbank.

Dr. h.c. Horst Teltschik has been President of Boeing Germany since 2003. Prior to this position he was Chairman of the Herbert Quandt Foundation (1993 to 2003), member of the Board of Management of BMW Group responsible for Economic and Governmental Affairs (1993 to 2000) and CEO of the Bertelsmann Foundation (1991 to 1992). From 1982 to 1990 he served as Ministerial Director at the Federal Chancellery being responsible for National Security Affairs under Chancellor Helmut Kohl and Head of the Directorate-General for Foreign and Intra-German Relations, Development Policy and External Security of the Federal Chancellory.

Shashi Tharoor is Under-Secretary-General for Communications and Public Information of the United Nations. Since 1978, he has been working for the United Nations, serving with the UN High Commissioner for Refugees whose Singapore office he headed during the "boat people" crisis. Since 1989, he has been a senior official at UN Headquarter New York where, until late 1996, he was responsible for peacekeeping operations in former Yugoslavia. From 1997 to 1998 he served as executive assistant to UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan and in 1998 he was appointed director of communications and special projects in the office of the Secretary-General.

Prof. Dr. Lester Thurow has been a professor of management and economics at MIT for more than 35 years. He was dean of the MIT Sloan School of Management from 1987 until 1993. He taught at Harvard from 1966 to 1968 after a term as a staff economist on President Lyndon Johnson's Council of Economic Advisers. His formal academic work focuses on globalization, economic instability and the distribution of income and wealth. He writes for the general public in a number of American and international newspapers. In the past Professor Thurow has served on the Editorial Board of the New York Times, as a contributing editor for Newsweek and as a member of Time magazine's Board of Economists. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and served as vice president of the American Economics Association in 1993.

Dr. Berthold Tillmann has been First Mayor of the City of Munster since 1999. He has been working for the municipal administration of Munster since 1980. He was City Treasurer from 1993 to 1999, Counsellor for the Directorate for Youth, Social Affairs and Health from 1984 to 1993 and personal assistant to the City Clerk in the Directorate for Education, Youth, Culture and Sports from 1980 to 1984.

Sir Peter Torry has been the British Ambassador to Germany since May 2003. He joined the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1970. One year later he went to Havanna as Third Secretary and from 1974 he served as Second Secretary in Jakarta. In 1977 he returned to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office as a First Secretary. From 1981 to 1985 he served as First Secretary in Bonn. In 1985 he returned again to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office as First Secretary and later as Counsellor. In 1989 he was posted as Counsellor in Washington where he served for four years, returning to London Headquarters in 1993 as Director for Personnel and Security. From 1998 to 2003 Sir Peter was British Ambassador to Spain.

Dr. Ernst Ulrich von Weizsäcker has been member of the German Bundestag as a representative of the Social Democrats since 1998. He is Chairman of the Bundestag Committee on Environment, Nature Conservation and Nuclear Safety. From 1999 to 2002 he headed the Enquête Commission "Globalization of the World Economy". Prior to that, he held the post of Director at the United Nation Centre for Science and Technology in New York and at the Institute for European Environmental Policies in Bonn, London and Paris. He is the recipient of several prestigious awards and is a prominent figure in German civil society.
