## **The World Ahead**

### **Challenges and Opportunities – Problems and Prospects**

The ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius holds its sixth Bucerius Summer School on Global Governance from August 13 to August 27, 2006 – for the third time in cooperation with the Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung.

Since 1971, the ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius, one of Germany's largest private foundations, has been involved in the funding of projects in various fields of science and research, arts and culture, as well as education and training. The ZEIT-Stiftung was established by Gerd Bucerius, the late founder and publisher of Germany's leading quality weekly, DIE ZEIT. Apart from the Bucerius Law School and the Bucerius Arts Forum, the Bucerius Summer School is the ZEIT-Stiftung's most important international project.

The Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung was established by the IT entrepreneur Heinz Nixdorf, who died in 1986. The Foundation promotes education, scientific research especially in the field of information technology, and projects devoted to the advancement of the liberal and democratic governmental system and of public health. Its Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum (HNF) in Paderborn is the largest computer museum in the world.

The Bucerius Summer School harks back to Henry Kissinger's renowned International Summer Seminar at Harvard University. In the nineteen-sixties, Kissinger brought together emerging leaders from all over the world for a summer course of debates and lectures. Many of the seminar's alumni went on to become ministers, renowned academics, prominent journalists – leaders in their respective fields.

Out of 275 applicants we have invited 58 promising junior business executives, politicians and academics from 30 different countries – young women and men between 28 and 35 years of age who have already acquired some professional experience but have not yet reached the peak of their careers.

The overall aim of the Bucerius Summer School is to foster leadership qualities in young professionals by involving them in an international dialogue on current political, economic, social and legal questions. Participants learn from and are inspired by high-profile speakers who are well-known public figures in politics, business, academia and the NGO sphere.

Theo Sommer, Editor-at-Large of DIE ZEIT, chairs the sessions of the Bucerius Summer School. This year, lectures and workshops will be held at the Hotel "Le Royal Meridien" in downtown Hamburg, at the German Foreign Office and the German Development Agency GTZ in Berlin, and at the Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum in Paderborn. Theo Sommer, Dean of the Bucerius Summer School, and Oliver Gnad, Director of the Bucerius Summer School, are responsible for the two-week program.

The list of speakers for the 2006 Bucerius Summer School includes Jürgen Fitschen, Board Member of Deutsche Bank; Timothy Garton Ash, Gerd Bucerius Senior Research Fellow in Contemporary History at the University of Oxford and one of the most eloquent essayists of our time; Irene Khan, Secretary General of amnesty international; Wim Kok, former Prime Minister of the Netherlands; William Kristol, Editor of *The Weekly Standard* and one of the key-figures of American neo-conservatism; Kishore Mahbubani, Dean of the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy in Singapore and a former career diplomat; Richard Sennett, London School of Economics and one of the leading sociologists in the Western hemisphere; Anne-Marie Slaughter, Dean of Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs; Shashi Tharoor, UN Under-Secretary-General for Communications and Public Information and nominee of the Indian Government for the succession of Kofi Annan as UN Secretary-General; as well as many other distinguished leaders from all over the world.

The Bucerius Summer School's topics will touch upon the most urgent cross-border challenges of our time: terrorism, the proliferation of WMD, energy security, and the need for environmental sustainability. It will also deal with limits and criteria of military intervention; migration induced by civil wars, ethnic cleansing, starvation and enduring poverty; pandemics such as HIV/AIDS, Malaria, or Avian Flu; climate change and the demogra-

phic problems of post-modern societies. This year's Bucerius Summer School promises to be especially interesting, as debates will focus on three geographical regions in particular: China, India, and Sub-Saharan Africa. While India and China are rising on the international power scale, Africa is getting increasingly marginalized – a phenomenon that will be carefully analyzed by the participants in workshops, simulations, case studies and plenary discussions.

But the Bucerius Summer School is more than just a two-week learning experience. Global governance in the 21st century is about building networks and enhancing cross-cultural cooperation of actors from all sectors of public life. This is what the Bucerius Summer School tries to achieve in the long run. To follow up on the annual meetings, the Bucerius Summer School runs an active alumni network. Roughly a dozen alumni chapters have sprung up worldwide. With the support of the ZEIT-Stiftung, alumni arrange regional follow-up seminars (so-called "Bucerius Governance Talks") to discuss current developments. The most recent example of alumni networking was a conference held in Geneva at the World Economic Forum; plans for further meetings in Frankfurt and Washington DC are in the making.

The ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius and the Heinz Nixdorf Stiftung welcome all speakers and participants. We wish them fruitful discussions, new insights and sustainable networking.

**Kurt Beiersdörfer** has been Managing Director of the Heinz Nixdorf MuseumsForum in Paderborn since 1997. Before joining the MuseumsForum in 1996, he served as Consultant and Associate Program Director at the Robert Bosch Foundation in Stuttgart.



**Christoph Bertram** served as Director of the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik, SWP) from 1998 to 2005. As one of the largest and most influential think-tanks in Europe, the SWP is frequently consulted by the German Government and Parliament on questions of foreign and security policy. Previously, Bertram served as Director of the International Institute for Strategic Studies and as foreign policy correspondent of the Hamburg-based weekly DIE ZEIT. Most recently (Spring 2006), he held the Steven Muller Chair in German Studies at the Bologna Center of the Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, The Johns Hopkins University.



**Georg Boomgaarden** has been State Secretary in the Federal Foreign Office since 2005. Previously (2003-2005), he served as Ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany to the Kingdom of Spain. From 1999 to 2002, he was Director for Latin American Affairs in the Federal Foreign Office. Prior to that, he headed the Division for Southern Latin America in the Federal Foreign Office (1995-1999). From 1992 to 1995, Boomgaarden was Head of the Economic Service at the German Embassy in Moscow. He served as Ambassador to Nicaragua from 1989 to 1992.

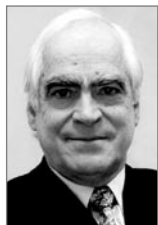




**Ivo H. Daalder** is Senior Fellow in Foreign Policy Studies at the Brookings Institution, Washington DC, where he also holds the Sydney Stein Jr. Chair in International Security. His current research focuses on the implications of globalization for US foreign policy, homeland security organization, and the role of the National Security Council.

Prior to joining Brookings, he was Associate

Professor at the University of Maryland's School of Public Affairs. From 1995 to 1996, he served as Director for European Affairs on President Clinton's National Security Council staff. From 1998 to 2001, Daalder served as a member of the Study Group of the US Commission on National Security/21st Century (the Hart-Rudman Commission). He is a member of the Academy of Political Science, the Council on Foreign Relations, the International Institute for Strategic Studies, and serves as Special Adviser at the Center for American Progress.



**Peter Eigen** is founder and former chairman of Transparency International, a non-governmental organization promoting transparency and accountability in regional and international development. He currently serves as Visiting Lecturer in Political Science at the Free University Berlin. Eigen has worked in economic development for 25 years, mainly as a World Bank manager of programs in Africa and Latin America. Under Ford Foundation sponsorship, he provided legal and technical assistance to the governments of Botswana and Namibia. He has taught law at several universities, including Frankfurt/Main, Georgetown, Harvard and Johns Hopkins. In 2001, he joined the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace as Visiting Scholar.

**Jürgen Fitschen** is a Member of Deutsche Bank's Group Executive Committee. He is also Head of Regional Management worldwide and Chairman of the Management Committee Germany. He joined Deutsche Bank in 1987. Positions he has held within the Group since then include: General Manager and Deputy Director, Bangkok Branch (1987); General Manager for Japan, Tokyo Branch (1990); and Executive Director, Regional Head Office Singapore (1993). He was a member of the Corporates and Real Estate Divisional Board (1997-98) and a member of the Global Corporates and Institutions Divisional Board (1998-2001). In March 2001, he was appointed to Deutsche Bank Group's Board of Managing Directors.



**Timothy Garton Ash** is Gerd Bucerius Senior Research Fellow in Contemporary History and Professor of European Studies at the University of Oxford; Director of the European Studies Centre at St. Antony's College, Oxford; and a Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institution, Stanford University. He is the author of eight books of political writing or 'history of the present' which have charted the transformation of Europe over the last quarter-century. His essays appear regularly in *The New York Review of Books*, and he writes a weekly column in *The Guardian* which is widely syndicated in Europe, Asia and the Americas. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, the Royal Historical Society, the Royal Society of Arts, and a Corresponding Fellow of the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Sciences.





**Jeff Gedmin** is Director of the Aspen Institute Berlin. Previously, he was a resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington DC, where he coordinated and directed the New Atlantic Initiative, a coalition of international institutes, politicians, leading journalists, and business executives dedicated to the revitalization and expansion of the Atlantic community of democracies. **Rahul Gandhi** is a Member of the Indian Parliament from Amethi, a constituency with a population of 2.5 million. Prior to his election as a Member of Parliament, he specialized in Development Economics, which he studied at Cambridge University. For four years, he served as strategy consultant with the Monitor Company, working in the fields of telecommunications, automobile, retail,

and energy industries. In 2001, he also started a Business Process Outsourcing company in the field of engineering design, in which he continues to take an active interest.



**Nicole Gnesotto** is Director of the European Union Institute for Security Studies. She formerly (1994-99) served as professor at the Institut d'Etudes Politiques of Paris (Sciences Po) and as Chargée de Mission to the Director of the French Institute for International Relations (IFRI). A specialist in security issues, she was a member of the Institute's research team from 1990 to 1993, after having been

Deputy Head of the French Foreign Ministry's policy planning staff from 1986 to 1990. From October 1999 to December 2001, she was Director of the Institute for Security Studies of the Western European Union.

**Michael Göring** is Chairman of the Executive Board of the ZEIT-Stiftung Ebelin und Gerd Bucerius. Before joining the ZEIT-Stiftung in 1997, he was Head of Foreign and Overseas Affairs at the German National Merit Foundation (Studienstiftung des deutschen Volkes) and Head of the Funding Department at the Alfried Krupp von Bohlen und Halbach Foundation. He is a member of various advisory boards, primarily foundations and organizations of higher education.



**Bartholomäus Grill** studied social education, sociology, and art history before becoming a journalist. He initially worked as cultural correspondent for the weekly *Deutsches Allgemeines Sonntagsblatt* in Hamburg, moving to the political desk of the weekly newspaper DIE ZEIT in 1987. From 1993, he was based in Johannesburg, South Africa, serving as the paper's Africa correspondent. He also wrote

foreign reports for *Profil*, Vienna, *Die Weltwoche*, Zurich, and reports on Africa for GEO magazine, Hamburg. He has headed the Africa office of DIE ZEIT in Cape Town since 2000. Recently, he was also appointed as DIE ZEIT's Berlin correspondent. Grill received the Journalists Prize for Development Policy in 1996, and the Media Prize of the German AIDS Foundation in 2005. **Uwe Jean Heuser** is Chief-Business-Editor at the Hamburg-based weekly DIE ZEIT. He joined the editorial staff in 1992. He has taught Economics, Communications, and Organization Theory at the University of Bonn (1984-86), Harvard College (1990-91),

and New York University (1995). His most recent book is entitled *Das Unbehagen im Kapitalismus – Die neue Wirtschaft und ihre Folgen* (Berlin 2000). Heuser holds a Ph.D. in Economics from Albertus Magnus University Cologne, and a Master of Public Administration from Harvard University.



**Peter Höppe** is Director of Geo Risks Research at the Munich Re Group, one of the world's largest reinsurers and the second-largest primary insurer in Germany. 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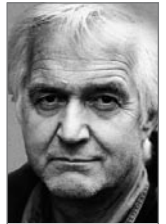
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
